St MARTIN DE PORRES

Martin was born in 1579 in Lima, Peru, the son of a former slave. He grew up in poverty and was taken in by a religious order as a servant boy. The monks looked down on Martin because he was mixed-race but in time his behaviour led to the Dominican Order stopping their racial limits on admission and he was made a full brother. He worked tirelessly on behalf of the poor, starting an orphanage and a children's hospital.

During his lifetime he was seen in other places. An African slave said Martin came to comfort him and many others. When the same man later saw him in Peru, he was very happy to meet him again and asked Martin if he had had a good voyage; but Martin had never left Lima.

In pictures, Martin de Porres is shown as a young man with a broom, since he thought all work sacred, no matter how lowly. He is also shown with a dog, cat and mouse, all eating in peace from the one dish.

St Martin de Porres is often shown with mice because, according to one story, the monastery had problems with rodents and decided to put traps out. Martin was so upset that he spoke to the mice and agreed that if they would leave the monastery, he would feed them at the back door of the kitchen. Rachel writes...

Recently, in a rare moment of clarity, I realised that if I were to be a season I should be 'autumn'. Even though this is the season in which the weather becomes inclement and the nights draw in, I find autumn both exhilarating and comforting. Example: I have permission to don my waxed jacket again, and pull on wellies for walks. One can wrap up warm and put the heating on. It is a time for cosiness and rich wines and soothing food. If I were allowed to eat more expansively I'd grow very fat during this season on partridge and wood pigeon, marron glacé and rich bramble pies.

Yes, autumn is a special time and November is its final flowering. The light dies early in November and, yet, you still get moments of blazing sun shining off the rich amber of oak leaves. As the wind blows, great piles of fallen leaves are sometimes lifted up to dance.

November is also the time where we both look back and also to look forward. We look back in remembrance – firstly on those who have died and gone to glory (All Souls Day) and then on the War Dead on Remembrance Sunday. This year our Service of Glad Remembrance for all who've died is on November 6th at 3pm. I hope that many of you will be able to join us for this occasion. Equally, during this period when we're remembering the shattering events of the Great War and are also aware that parts of the world are in a complete mess, I hope you'll be able to make time to be with us on November 13th for our Remembrance Sunday service.

Yet, if November entails remembrance, it also gestures towards hope. On Sunday 27th is Advent Sunday. On that day we enter a period of great anticipation and waiting, as we begin to prepare for the extraordinary joy of Christmas Day. A season both of Light and of Penitence, Advent offers us an opportunity to look forward and reflect on how we can become closer to God. This year I'm excited about the prospect of having a Tuesday afternoon Advent Group to

which all at both St Nick's & St Chad's are invited, as well as a reciprocal group at St Chad's on Wednesday evenings. I hope it's a sign of our emergent closer ties with St Chad's.

So this November shall be a busy one. In addition to all the church activities, we also have our Christmas Fair. Yet, if we risk being over-busy as we draw to the end of another year, let us also take pause. If there are bright and crisp days this November, I hope each of us can take a moment to wonder and delight at Creation; I hope that as the nights become bleak and wet, we have warmth and good company; and through it all we can face the seasons of Advent and Christmas with hope, expectation and delight.

Dedicated to all Defenders of Human Freedoms: The Art of Paul Peter Piech at the People’s History Museum

The People’s History Museum in Manchester is well worth a visit. It houses material relating to the history of working people in Britain from the Co-operative Movement to Women’s suffrage, workers’ banners and the Peterloo massacre.

At the moment there is an exhibition entitled *Dedicated to all Defenders of Human Freedom: The Art of Paul Peter Piech*. Paul Peter Piech was an artist, humanitarian and campaigner. The curators state:

“Piech’s influences were many, not least politics and equality, through to jazz and poetry. His print making was infused with both a desire to reflect the world’s wrong back on itself, and to demonstrate the power of compassion and art.”

His work is striking using just one or two colours to show text in a large format– sometimes just a single word, or based on poems by Walt Whitman or text by Thomas Paine– along with powerful images.

This may sound a bit intense but each poster is exciting visually and very thought provoking. His daughter spoke passionately at a preview evening and described how he was he warm, friendly and compassionate man.

Next time you are in the city centre – take a few minutes to pop into the museum and see the exhibition. It is on till 12th February 2017 and is family friendly and suitable for all ages.
